



Newly Appointed Archbishop of Canterbury

We celebrate the historic appointment of London Bishop Sarah Mullally to be the new Archbishop of Canterbury on October 3. Bishop Mullally will be the first woman to fill this role as leader of both the Church of England and the worldwide Anglican Communion.



Additionally, we cherish our ties with members of the Anglican Communion who are grieved by this appointment, and we affirm that we are made one as Christ's body, acting alongside one another to do God's work in the world. We pray for the unity of the whole Anglican Communion, for Bishop Mullally's joyful installation, that God will fill her with wisdom and discernment in her new role.

Mahrya MacIntire, daughter of St. Anne's parishioners, Charles & Mary Saunders, was baptized and confirmed here at St. Anne's, and was an associate producer of the Reston documentary. Mahrya has gone on to produce several feature documentaries with HBO Max. These include *Baltimore Rising*, a film about Baltimore in the aftermath of the death of Freddie Gray in police custody; *The Slow Hustle*, a film about corruption in the Baltimore Police Department. *The Slow Hustle* and *An American Bombing* were both

Emmy nominated.

On November 4, Virginians will elect a governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general and all 100 members of the House of Delegates. Some jurisdictions will also vote for local officials and issues.


